point or another. But when a chair breaks, the craftsman who built it can make repairs to return it to working order. And when humanity broke, the Master Builder put a plan in motion that would end with His coming among us and repairing the damage that was done.

When Christ came among us, lived with us, taught us how to live well, and ultimately sacrificed His life, He took all of the brokenness, wounds, and sin of the world upon Himself. Though we closed the door to paradise on ourselves through our sinfulness, Christ came and died so that the door may be thrust wide open. In the Gospel, we read that upon His death, the veil of the Temple that separated the Jewish people from the Holy of Holies was torn, symbolizing the fact that the gates of Heaven were opened, and we could all enter because of the sacrifice Jesus made. We were cleansed by His baptizing

water and forgiving blood. While the gates of Heaven are surely open, the onus is still on each of us to choose to enter or not. We do this by ordering the disorder we have inherited; we order it by living virtuous, holy lives and seeking Christ's forgiveness for our wrongdoing. Each and every decision will drive us further from or closer to Heaven. Here's the thing: it's hard to make every decision a gracious one. We still mess up, and if we're not careful, we mess up a whole lot. What can help us to stay on track?

The clear answer is prayer – asking for God's help is the only thing that can anchor our behavior in that ancient established order. We are helpless on our own.

Today is the Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary, celebrating the prayer that Our Blessed Mother gave us and has given strength to so many people throughout the centuries. The prayer helps us to meditate on the great mysteries of the salvation offered to us through the life and death of Jesus Christ. It is a simple prayer, for God is simple. It is a repetitive prayer, for we need to remind ourselves again and again to rage against the temptation to sin. And it is a meditative prayer, for we have to take time consider the weight of the consequences of how we live our lives. I would encourage all people, and particularly our students at Newman Catholic, to pray the rosary if you never have before. It may feel like a marathon at first, but all of a sudden, you may find you enjoy it as a retreat from the world around you. You may find it to be a blessed time where you can truly consider what is important. You may find it to be a powerful weapon against the disorder around us, and a step toward the order we were all created for.
